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

OAKWOOD UNIVERSITY BRIEF HISTORY

Oakwood University, which began as an industrial school, was founded by the Seventh-day Adventist Church in 1896 to educate African-Americans in the South. The school was erected on 380 acres purchased during the previous year for \$6,700. Additional property secured in 1918 nearly tripled its land holding. The school underwent several name changes over its history:

1896 - Oakwood Industrial School

1904 - Oakwood Manual Training School

1917 – Oakwood Junior College

1943 – Oakwood College

2008 – Oakwood University

Several principals served the school until it achieved Junior College status and elected its first president, James I. Beardsley, in 1917.

In 1943, Oakwood received its first accreditation as a junior college, having already begun the process of achieving senior college status. Fifteen years later, in 1958, it was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award associate and baccalaureate degrees. The most recent reaffirmation of accreditation was voted in June, 2001. In addition, continuing accreditation by the Adventist Accrediting Association was granted in April, 2006. On January 1, 2008, Oakwood College became Oakwood University offering its first masters degree in pastoral studies.

Student enrollment and graduation statistics have grown significantly since Oakwood's inception. When the school first opened in 1896, there were 16 students. By 1917, there were more than 100 students. Enrollment peaked at 200 in 1927. Enrollment first topped 1000 during the 1974-75 academic year. Enrollment for Fall 2009 was 1916.

The first graduating class in 1909 numbered five. Nine years later (1918), the first two graduates of Oakwood Junior College received degrees. The first senior college graduating class (Spring, 1945) consisted of nine students. Twenty-eight years later, in 1973, the first class in the history of the college to exceed 100 members graduated (124). The first graduating class in excess of 200 finished just nine years later in 1982. The most recent graduating class (2009) totaled 275 (includes certificates).

Oakwood University has a beautiful natural setting on 1,185 acres of prime land. It is considered one of the historical landmarks of the city of Huntsville, a cosmopolitan city of approximately 175,000 people located in north central Alabama. The university prepares students from across America and from many other nations to serve God and humanity in a variety of positions and careers. Over 62 percent of the culturally diverse faculty hold doctorate degrees from a wide range of universities and colleges around the nation and world.

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



Fall 2009



Asian = 2 Black = 209 Hispanic = 4White = 11






ACADEMIC STRUCTURE




PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY RANK


PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY DEGREES

PERCENTAGE OF PART-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY DEGREES



PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY







PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY ETHNICITY




PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY GENDER






PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY RANK







PERCENTAGE OF APPLICANTS GRANTED ACCEPTANCE vs. NOT ACCEPTED



PERCENTAGE OF ACCEPTED APPLICANTS ENROLLED vs. NOT ENROLLED






Undergraduates Only Fall 2009




PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME STUDENTS

All Students Fall 2009




PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME STUDENTS






Undergraduates Only Spring 2010




PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME STUDENTS






PERCENTAGE OF DEGREES/CERTIFICATES AWARDED

2009








PERCENTAGE OF ON-CAMPUS AND OFF-CAMPUS STUDENTS


(Undergraduates Only) Fall 2009

(Undergraduates Only) Spring 2010



RESEARCH SERVICES

Reference – Have Questions? Get answers @ your library. Librarians provide assistance for all types of information questions; expertise in developing research strategies and help with using a variety of electronic and print resources. Visit the information desk, email via the ask-a-librarian link, or call 256-726-7247.

Consultations – Significant research projects often require more assistance than can be given at the Information Desk. Professional librarians are happy to schedule individual appointments with you to aid you in these research projects. Please contact one of our reference librarians.

Instruction - Learn how to locate, evaluate and use the library's print and non-print resources; how to access resources available on campus and around the world. Contact a librarian regarding individual or group instruction.

Library Catalog – Provides on and off-campus access to the library's collections of books and media materials.

College Archives & Museum – This is a unique collection of artifacts, biographies, documents, manuscripts, and historical records about the history of Oakwood University Black Seventh-day Adventist Churches and Black Seventh-day Adventists. The Archives is open from 8:00 am - 5:30 pm, Monday through Thursday, and from 8:00 am – 1:00 pm on Friday. Call 256-726-7249 to schedule other appointments. **Media Resources** – Thousands of multi-media resources are available for study, research and instruction.

Religion Reading Room – Access to Religion/Theology reference materials. It is located on the main floor and is available when the library is open. This is a non-circulating collection.

Periodicals – In addition to the many electronic databases, over 400 current print journals, magazines, and newspapers are displayed and available for research and recreational reading on the third floor. Several very popular titles are available for in library use at the Circulation Desk.

Reserves – Items in high demand are available for 2 hour use in library.

CIRCULATION SERVICES

The **Circulation service desk** is located in the lobby on the main floor and is staffed whenever the library is open. It is available for checking-out and returning materials including reserves and interlibrary loans; picking up print jobs, reserving study rooms, and paying fines. Circulation staff is responsible for reshelving library books and stacks management; answering questions about missing books, placing holds and other questions related to borrowing library materials.

Interlibrary Loans – Books and articles are borrowed from other libraries for faculty, students and staff. Interlibrary loan requests usually take up to 10 days. Every effort is made to provide this service at no cost. There is \$10.00 charge for **RUSH** (within 24 hrs.) requests. To place a request, complete the appropriate online form or contact <u>Elizabeth Mosby</u> (emosby@oakwood.edu) at 256.726.7248. Please provide sufficient information for book and/or article requested.

Reciprocal Borrowing - Using you current Oakwood University ID card, students and faculty may borrow books from the **J.F. Drake Memorial Learning Resource Center** at Alabama A&M University (http://my.aamu.edu) and **Athens State University Library** (http://www.athens.edu/library)

TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

Wireless Access - Current students, faculty and staff may access the wireless network by using their Oakwood University email user name & ID number. Guest login is available upon request at Circulation.

Databases – The library offers over a hundred electronic databases that support a cross section of academic disciplines. Most of these databases contain the full-text of articles. All can be accessed on and off-campus.

Off-campus access – Oakwood University faculty, staff and students must have an Oakwood email address and password to access the library's databases off-campus. Contact Chris Dewitt at ext 7517 or at cdewitt@oakwood.edu to verify login info.

Media Resources – Houses and provides access to the non-print materials owned by the Eva B. Dykes Library. This collection includes more than 8,000 DVDs, CD's, videos, audio cassettes, production equipment and hardware. Listening and viewing facilities are available for in-library use of materials. Many items are included in the **Library Catalog** and may be checked out. Consult **Media Resources** for more information.

Computers – The Computer Lab houses and manages 42 networked computers for use by faculty, staff and students. An additional 12 computers are available for public use on the main floor and upper level.

Copier & Printer – Black and white copy and printing services are available for 10 cents per page. Color copying is available at the Copy Center.



Teachers' Cottages	1947	houses the Art program, the Chaplain's Office, the Counseling Center, the Health Center, the Literature Evangelist Training Center and Career Services and Work Education
W.H. Green Hall	1952	houses teachers' offices and classrooms for the Departments of Psychology and Social Work
H.E. Ford Hall	1954	houses the Student Center, student leadership offices and Student Services office
N.E. Ashby Auditorium	1956	the gymnasium
University Market	1957	University Market, Snack bar and Bookstore
Physical Plant	1959	houses offices for Physical Plant, Shipping/Receiving, Transportation, Warehouse and Post Office
Anna Knight Hall	1960; renovated in 1992	houses the Department of Education
G.E. Peters Hall	1964	houses teachers' offices and classrooms for the Department of Music and a fine arts auditorium
Bessie Carter Hall	1966	residence hall for freshmen women
W.J. Blake Memorial Center	1968	contains the administrative offices of the University and the cafeteria
O.B. Edwards Hall	1969	residence hall for men upperclass men

Eva B. Dykes Library	1973	modern learning, resource and research center. Houses a media area with audiovisual equipment, a library archives and museum; an Ellen G. White research room and branch office, group study rooms and classroom, Technology Department
Family & Consumer Sciences Home Management Residence	1973	Family & Consumer Science students utilize this facility for a practicum in several classes
J.T. Stafford Building	1974	educational center consisting of classrooms, laboratories, and offices for Oakwood Academy
W.R. Beach Natatorium	1974	houses an Olympic-size swimming pool, classrooms, and offices for the Department of Health & Physical Education
Oakwood University Church	1977	seating capacity of 2,700
Moseley Complex	1977	houses teachers' offices and classrooms for the Department of Religion and Theology, and the C.T. Richards chapel
wocg	1979	Oakwood University radio station
E.A.Cooper Complex	1981	houses laboratories, classrooms, offices and storage spaces for the Departments of Biology, Chemistry, Family and Consumer Sciences, Mathematics and Computer Science, and Nursing
Natelka E. Burrell Hall	renovated 1982	houses offices and classrooms for the Department of Communication
Oakwood University Skating Rink	1986	the skating rink and features adjoining racquetball courts
Trula E. Wade Hall	1991	residence hall for upperclass women
Business & Technology Complex	2001	houses faculty offices and classrooms for the Department of Business and Information Systems, an auditorium that seats more than 300 people, a Board of Trustees meeting room, and facilities for the Information Technology Department

West Oaks Apartments	2002	consists of six two-story apartment buildings, three for male resident and three for female residents.
Oakwood University Industries building	Acquired 2004	located at 4920 University Square; houses support services such as Health and Counseling services, WJOU Radio Station, the Office of Grants and Contracts, the Community Development Center and houses business that network with and/or employ Oakwood University students and employees.
Bradford-Cleveland-Brooks Institute for Continuing Education in Ministry	2007	a 10,000 square foot extension to the Calvin E. Moseley Religion Complex; includes a foyer with a legacy lobby and transition hall, an auditorium, four classrooms, a learning research lab, and four offices.
Holland Hall	2008	resident hall for freshman and sophomore males.
