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# GENERAL INFORMATION

## **OAKWOOD UNIVERSITY BRIEF HISTORY**

Oakwood University, which began as an industrial school, was founded by the Seventh-day Adventist Church in 1896 to educate African-Americans in the South. The school was erected on 380 acres purchased during the previous year for \$6,700. Additional property secured in 1918 nearly tripled its land holding. The school underwent several name changes over its history:

1896 – Oakwood Industrial School  
1904 – Oakwood Manual Training School  
1917 – Oakwood Junior College  
1943 – Oakwood College  
2008 – Oakwood University

Several principals served the school until it achieved Junior College status and elected its first president, James I. Beardsley, in 1917.

In 1943, Oakwood received its first accreditation as a junior college, having already begun the process of achieving senior college status. Fifteen years later, in 1958, it was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award associate and baccalaureate degrees. The most recent reaffirmation of accreditation was voted in June, 2001. In addition, continuing accreditation by the Adventist Accrediting Association was granted in April, 2006. On January 1, 2008, Oakwood College became Oakwood University offering its first masters degree in pastoral studies.

Student enrollment and graduation statistics have grown significantly since Oakwood's inception. When the school first opened in 1896, there were 16 students. By 1917, there were more than 100 students. Enrollment peaked at 200 in 1927. Enrollment first topped 1,000 during the 1974-75 academic year. Enrollment for Fall 2011 was 2,006.

The first graduating class in 1909 numbered five. Nine years later (1918), the first two graduates of Oakwood Junior College received degrees. The first senior college graduating class (Spring, 1945) consisted of nine students. Twenty-eight years later, in 1973, the first class in the history of the college to exceed 100 members graduated (124). The first graduating class in excess of 200 finished just nine years later in 1982. The most recent graduating class (2011) totaled 305 (includes masters and certificates).



Oakwood University has a beautiful natural setting on 1,185 acres of prime land. It is considered one of the historical landmarks of the city of Huntsville, a cosmopolitan city of approximately 175,000 people located in north central Alabama. The university prepares students from across America and from many other nations to serve God and humanity in a variety of positions and careers. Over 62 percent of the culturally diverse faculty hold doctorate degrees from a wide range of universities and colleges around the nation and world.

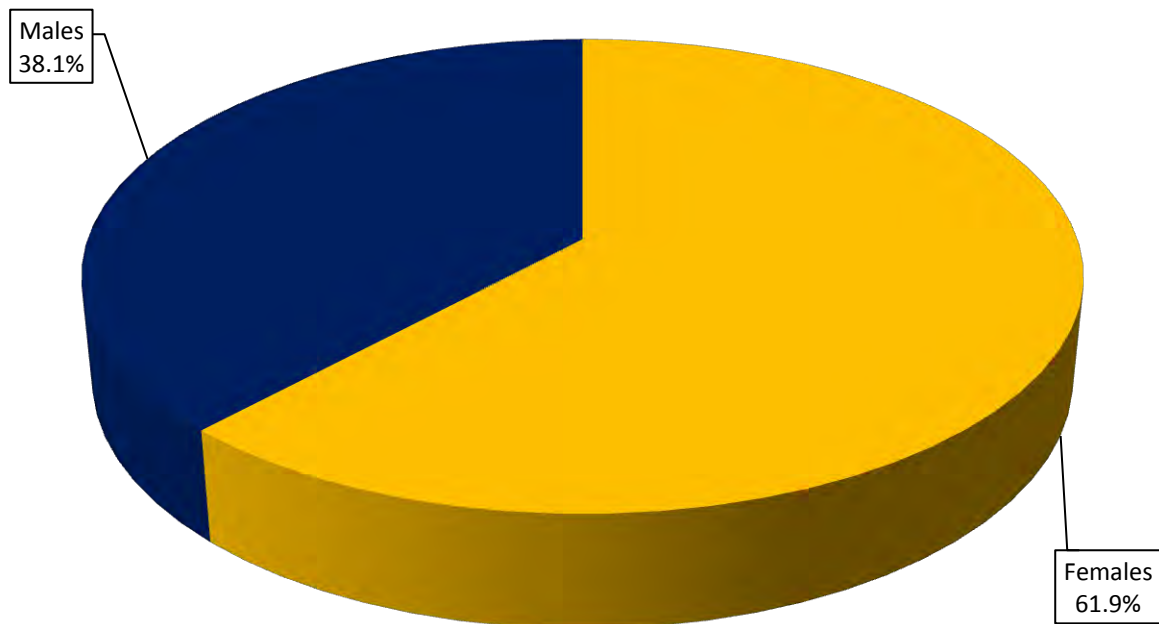

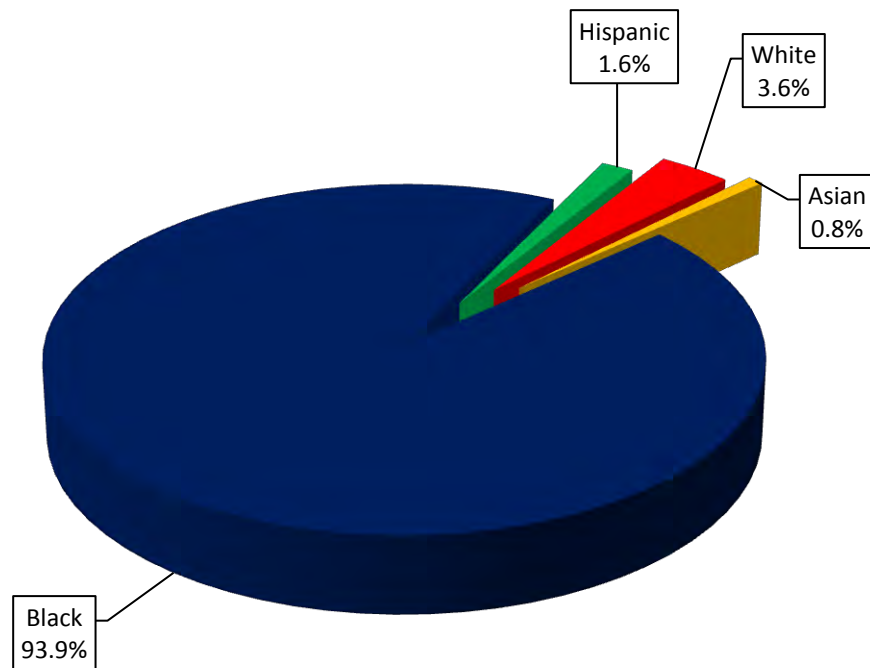

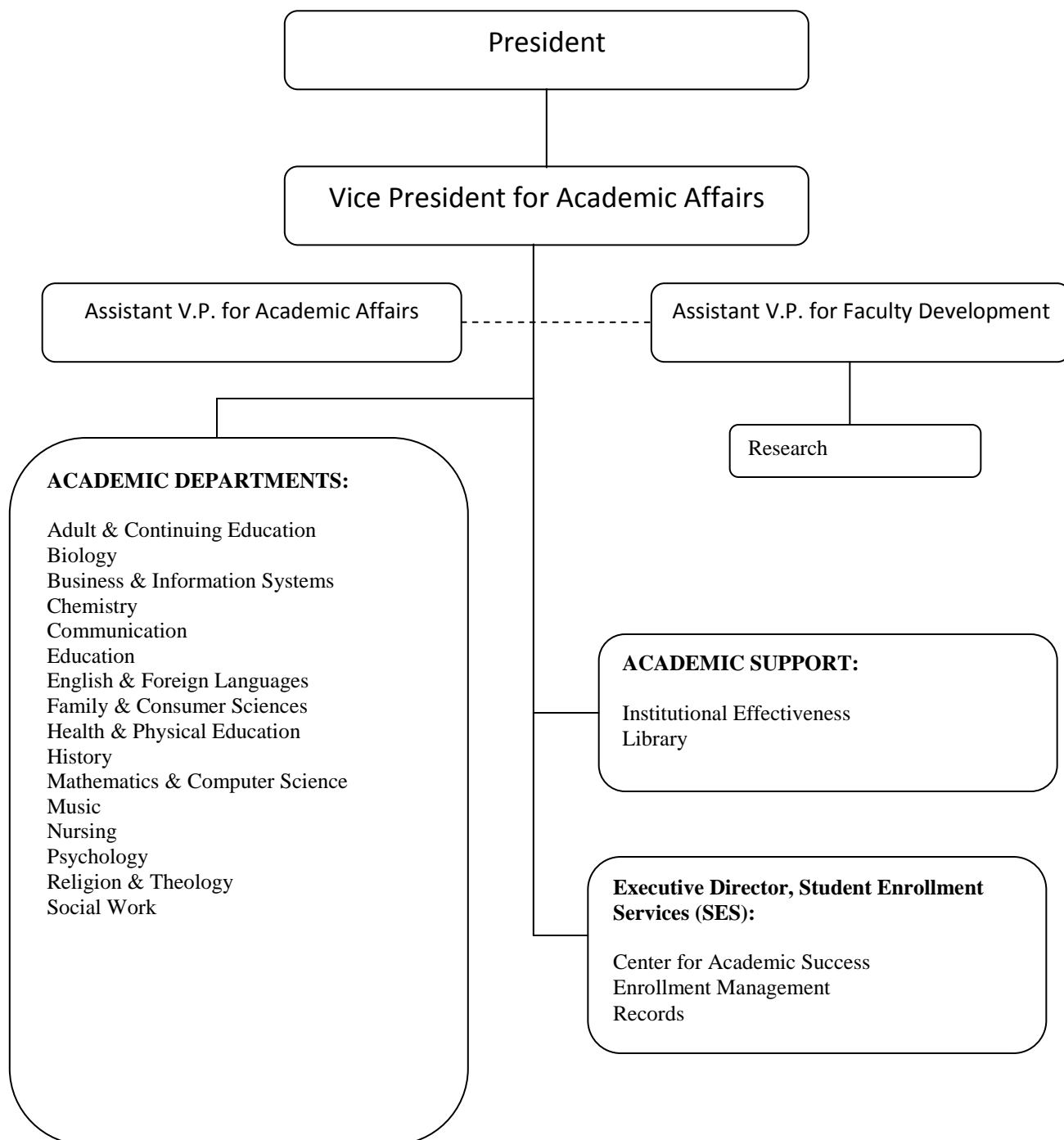

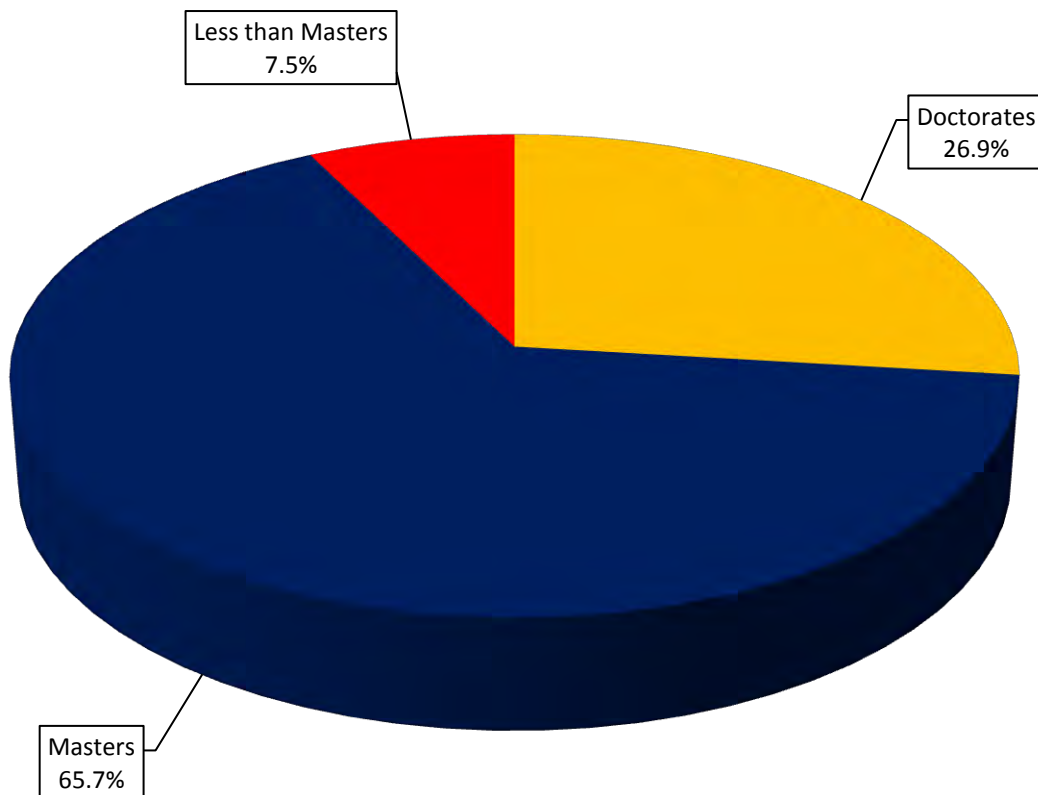

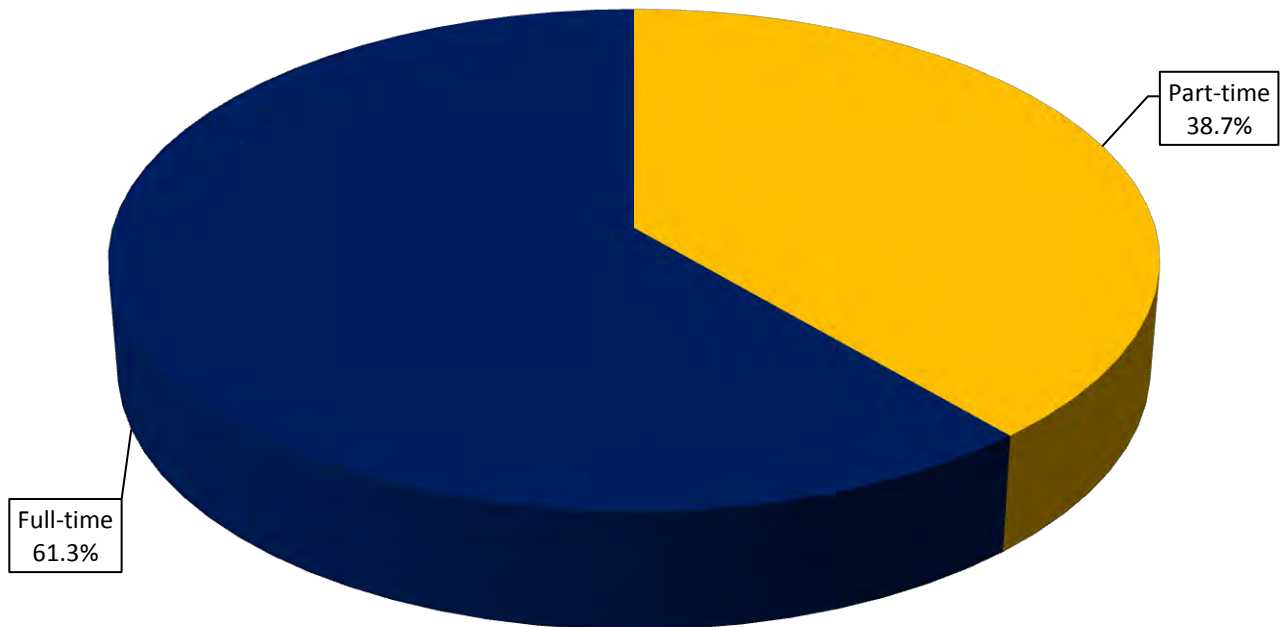

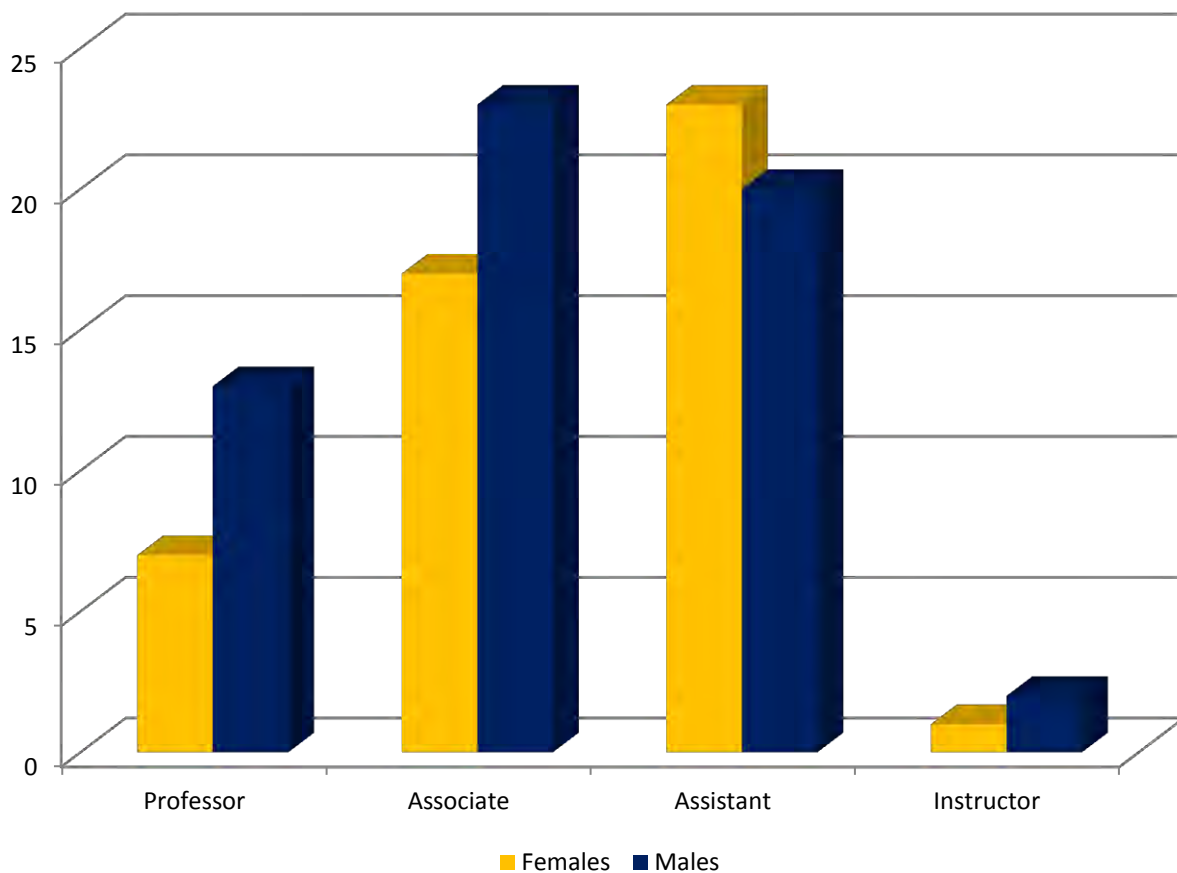

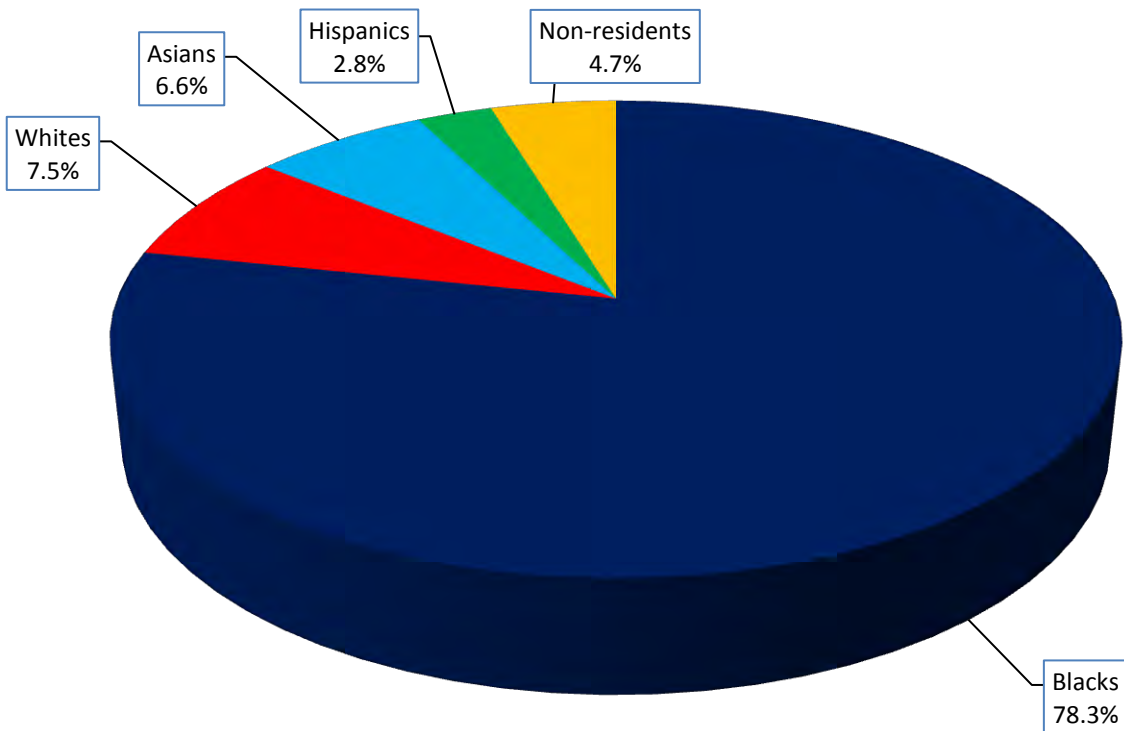

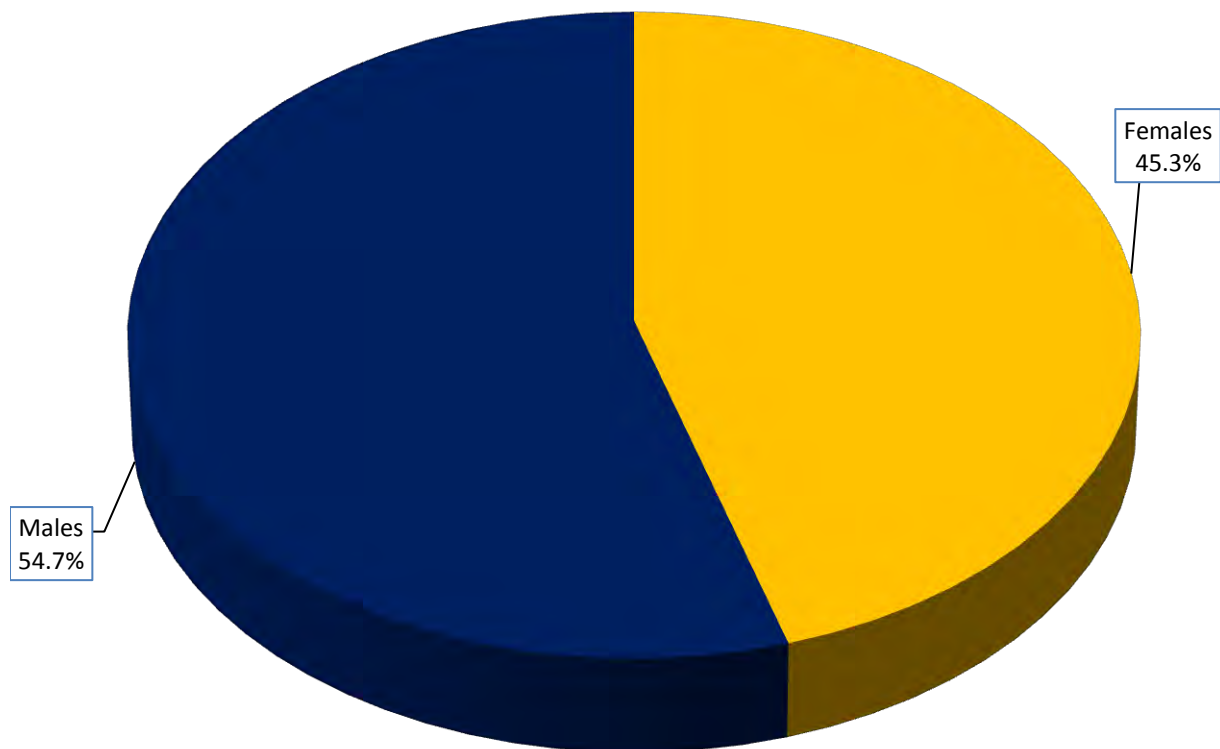

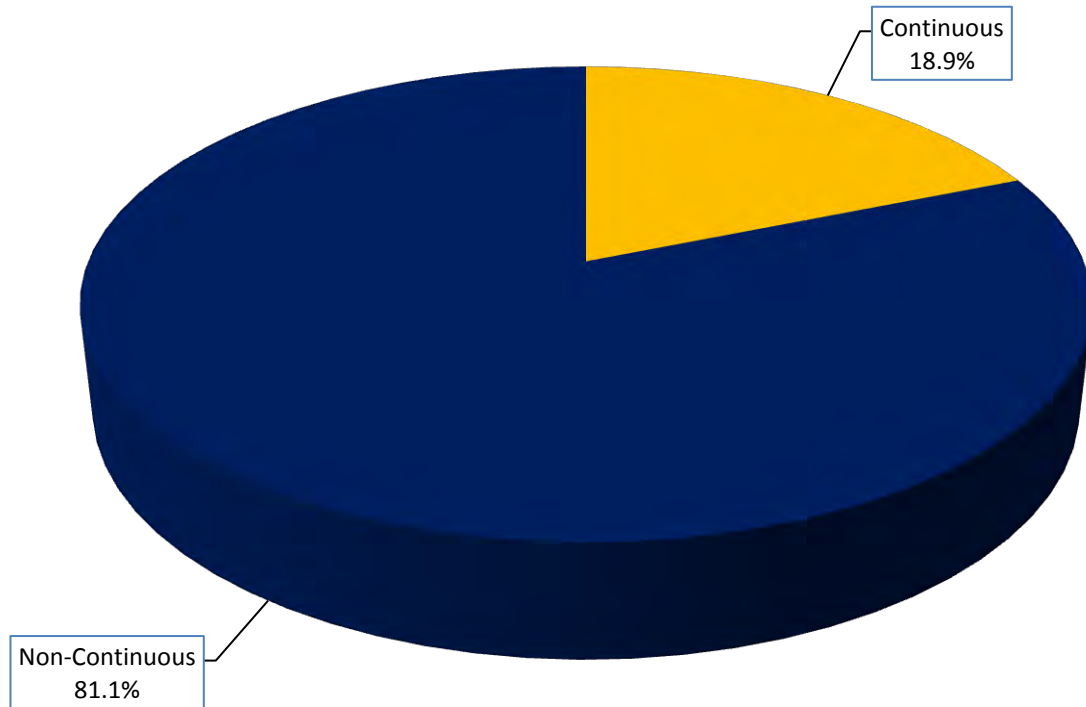
## PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY BY ETHNICITY

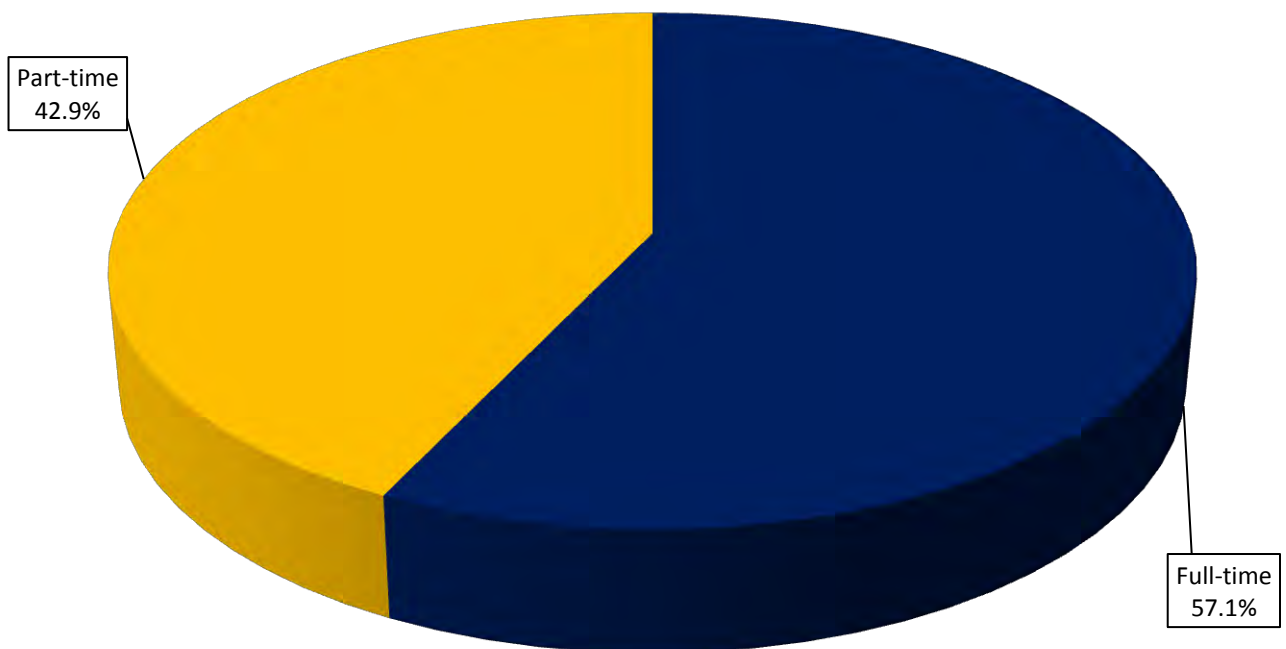

## **PERCENTAGE OF APPLICANTS GRANTED ACCEPTANCE vs. NOT ACCEPTED**

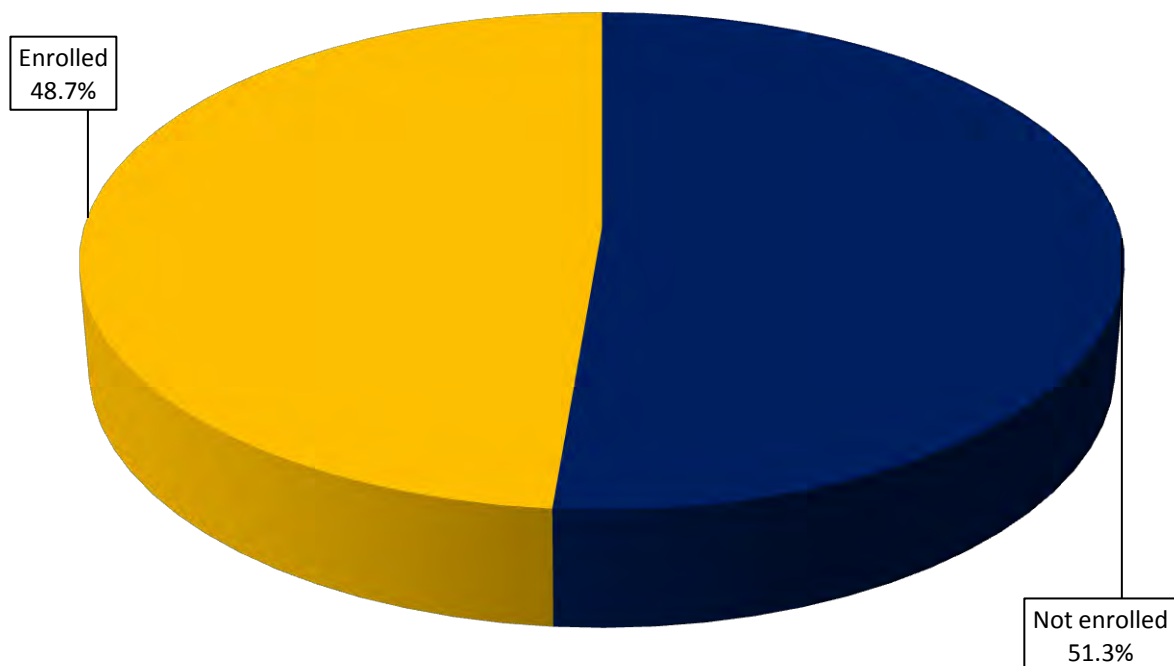

## **PERCENTAGE OF ACCEPTED APPLICANTS ENROLLED vs. NOT ENROLLED**

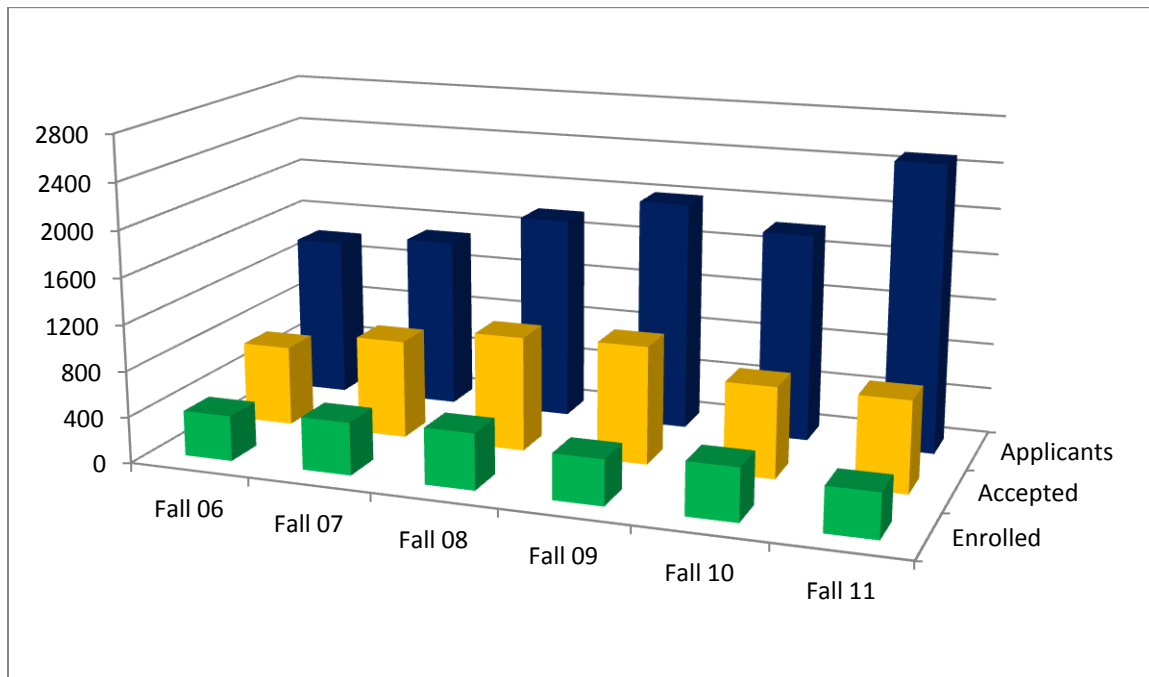

## PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS BY GENDER

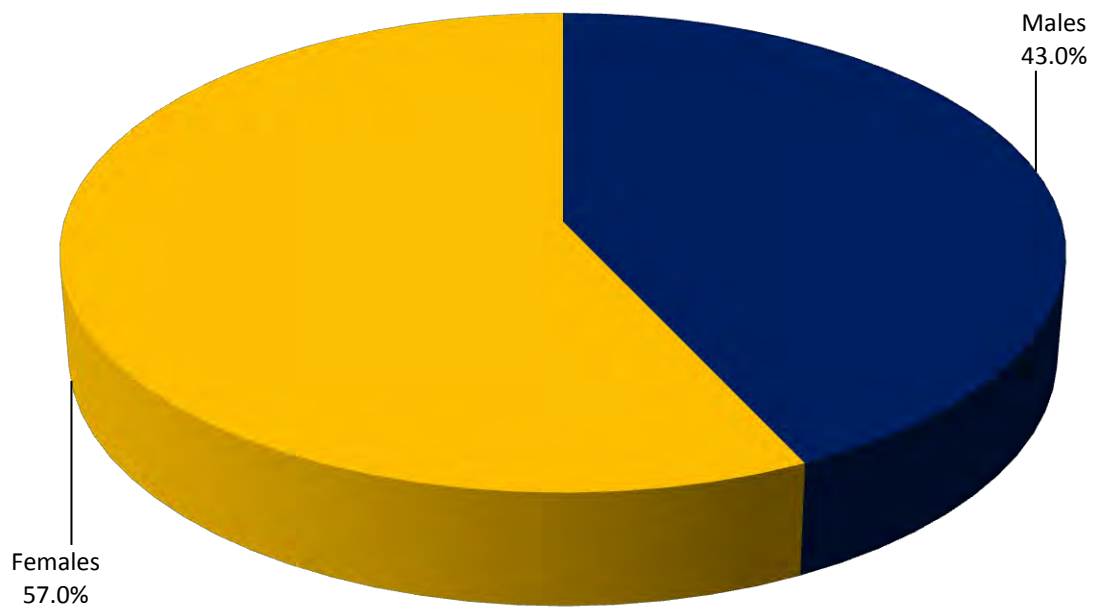

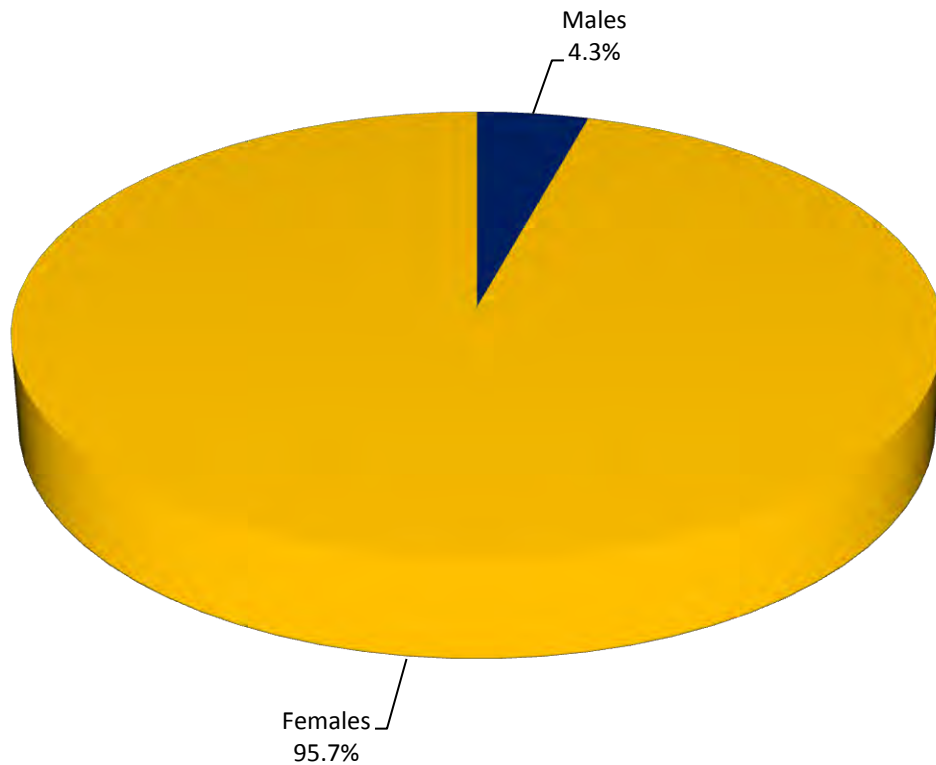

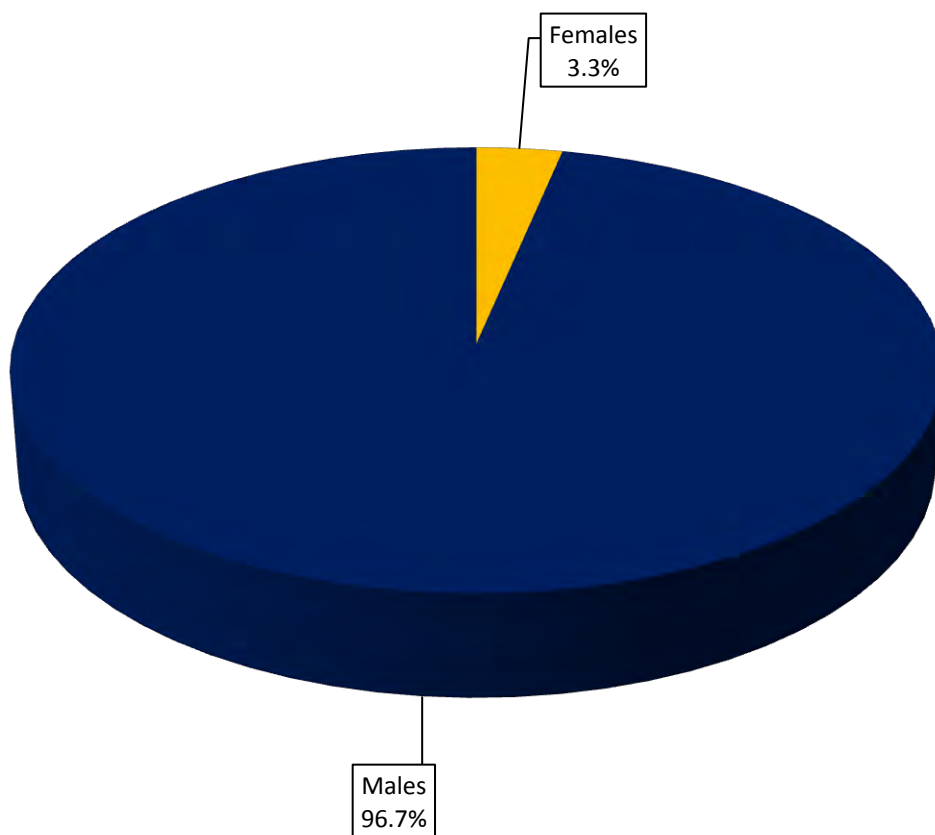
## **PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS BY GENDER**

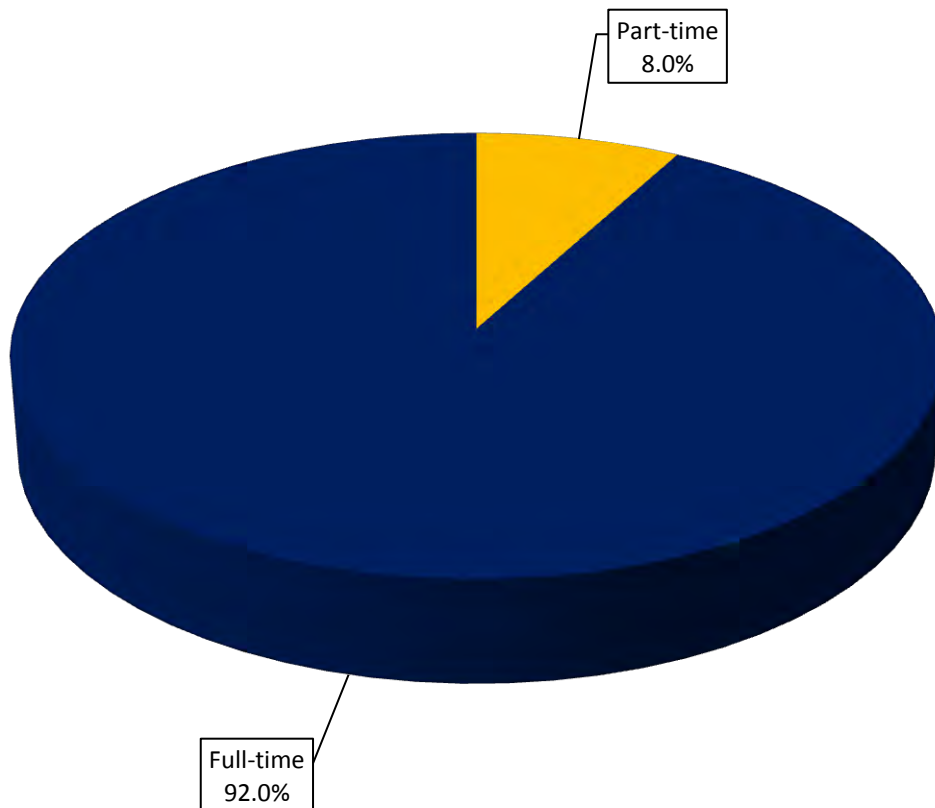

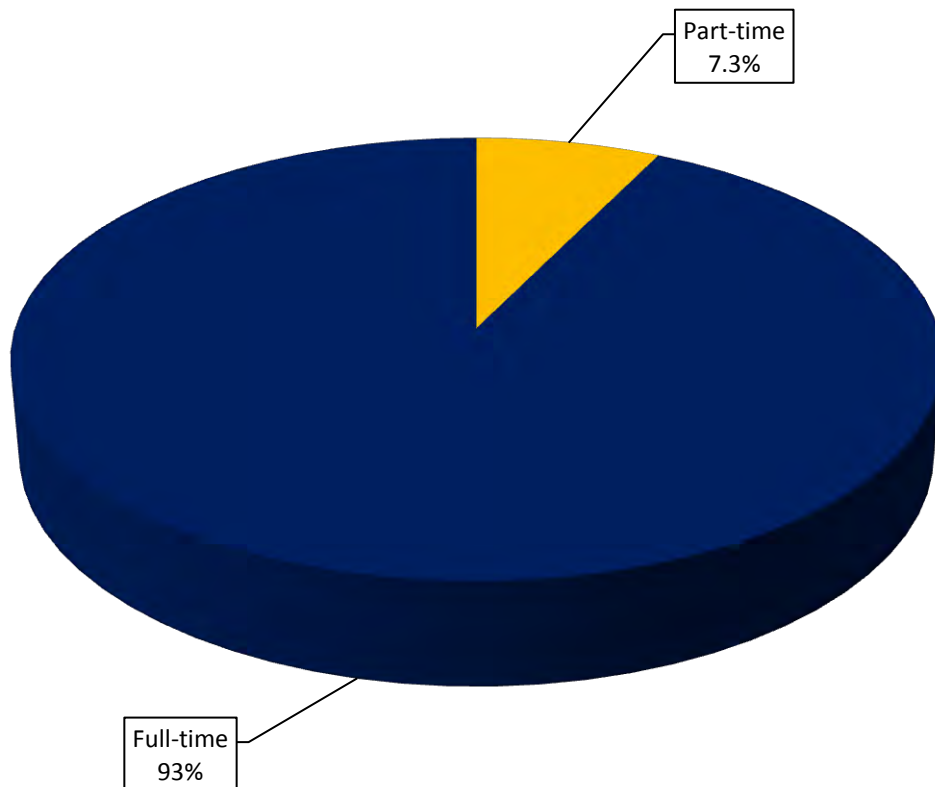
## PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME STUDENTS

Fall 2011



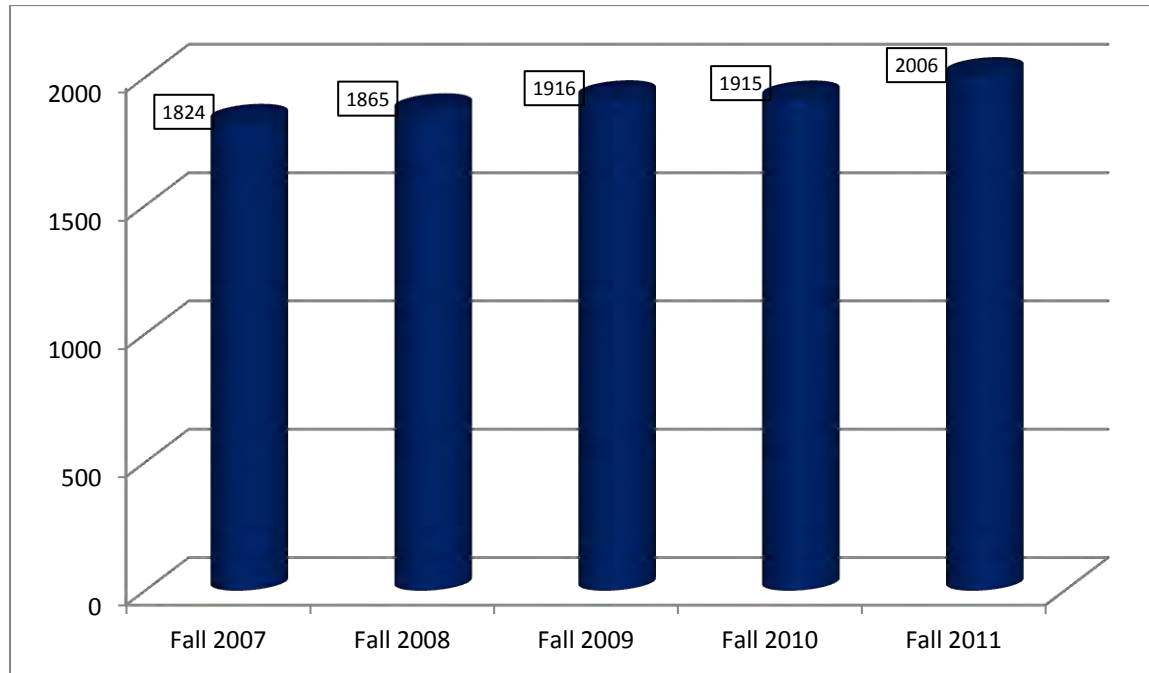
## PERCENTAGE OF FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME STUDENTS

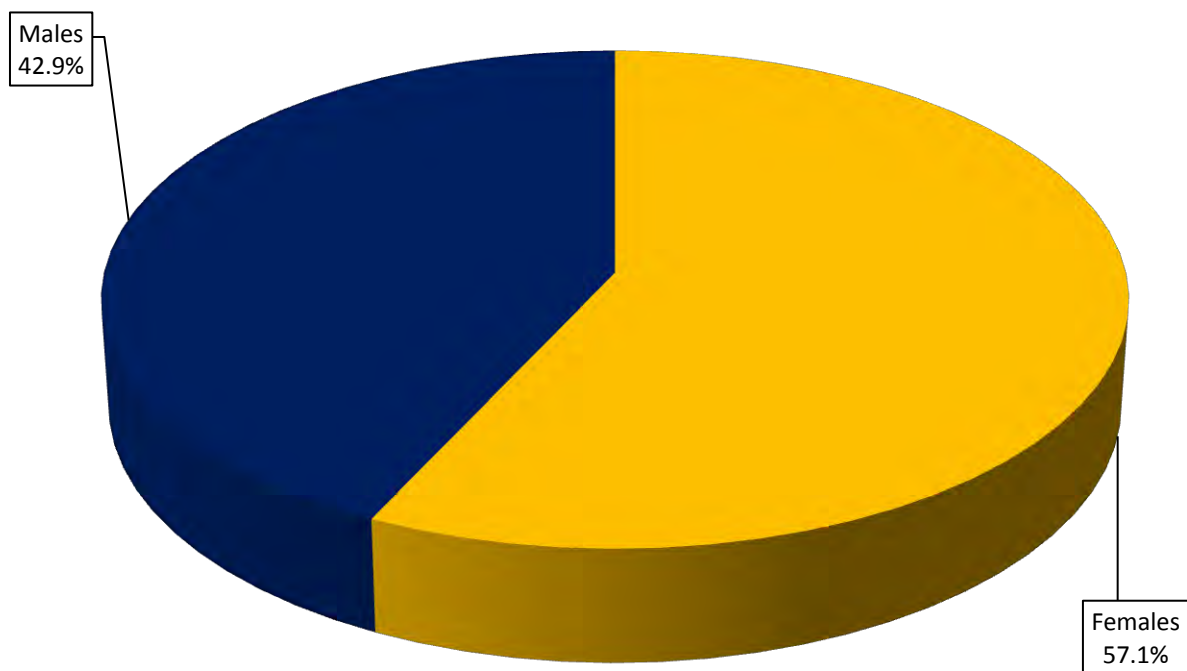

## PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS BY GENDER

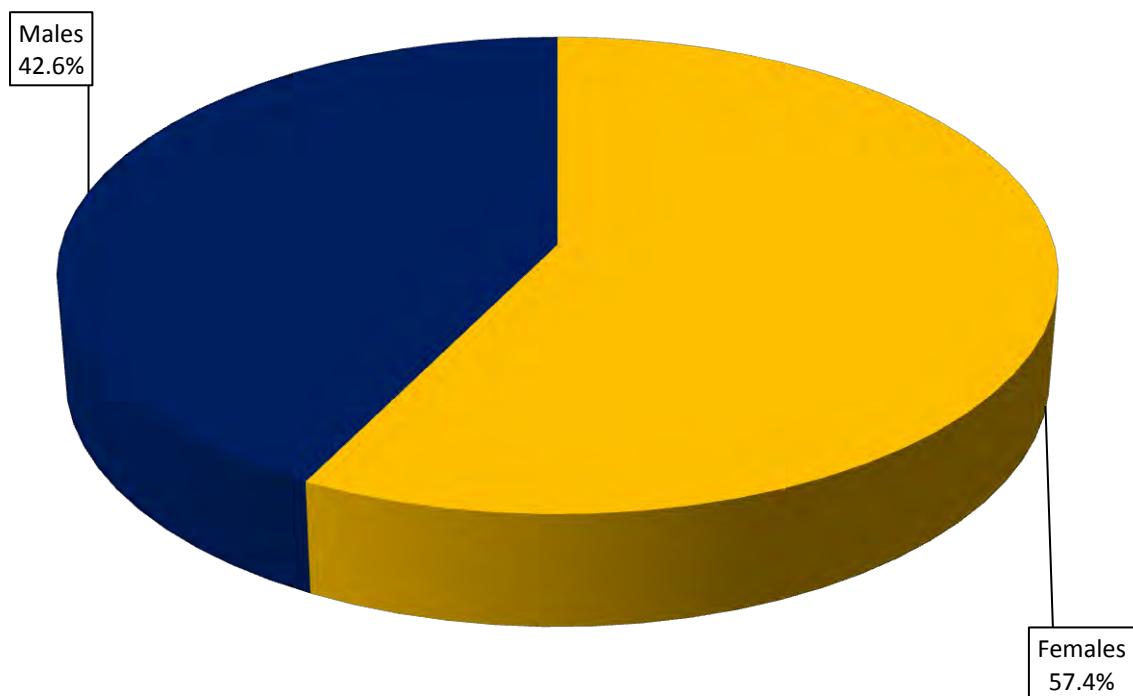

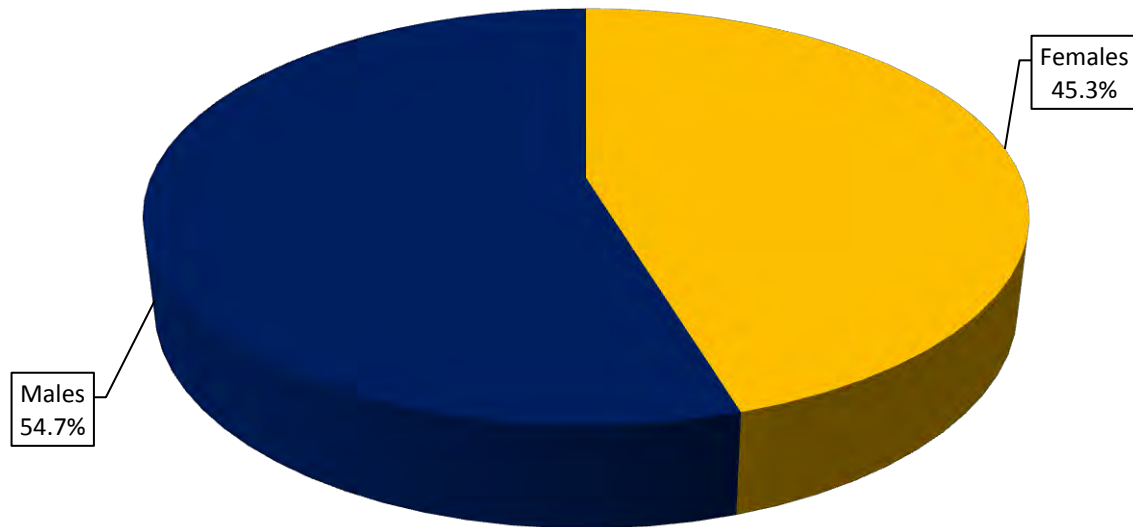
## **PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS BY GENDER**

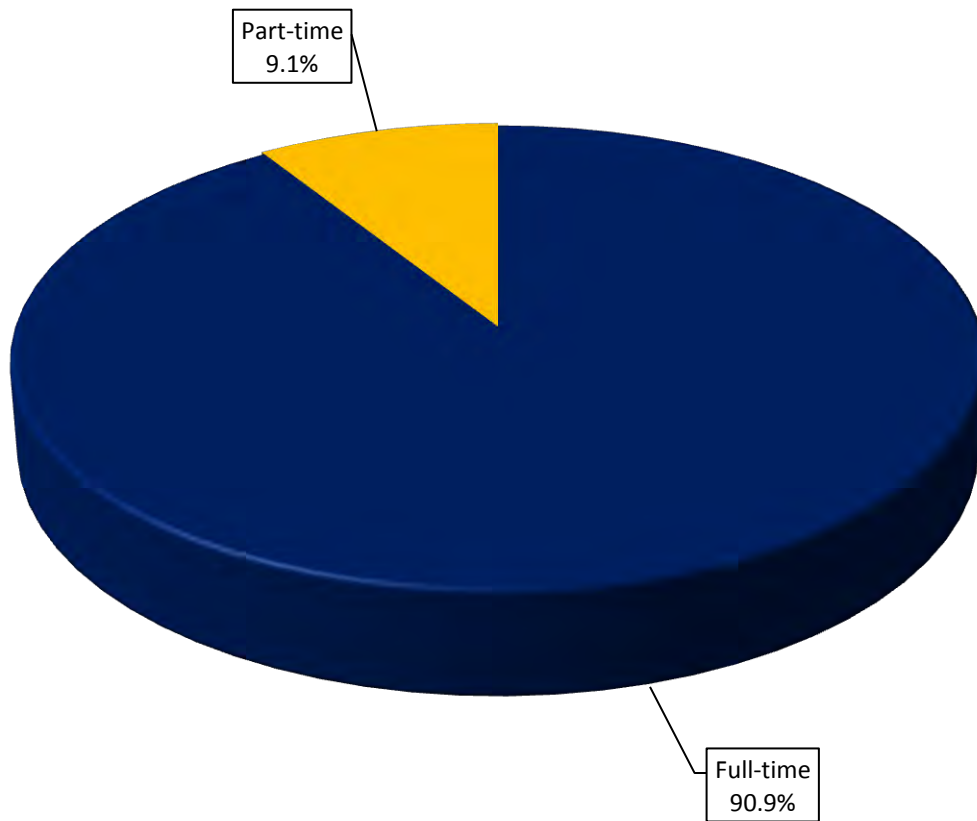

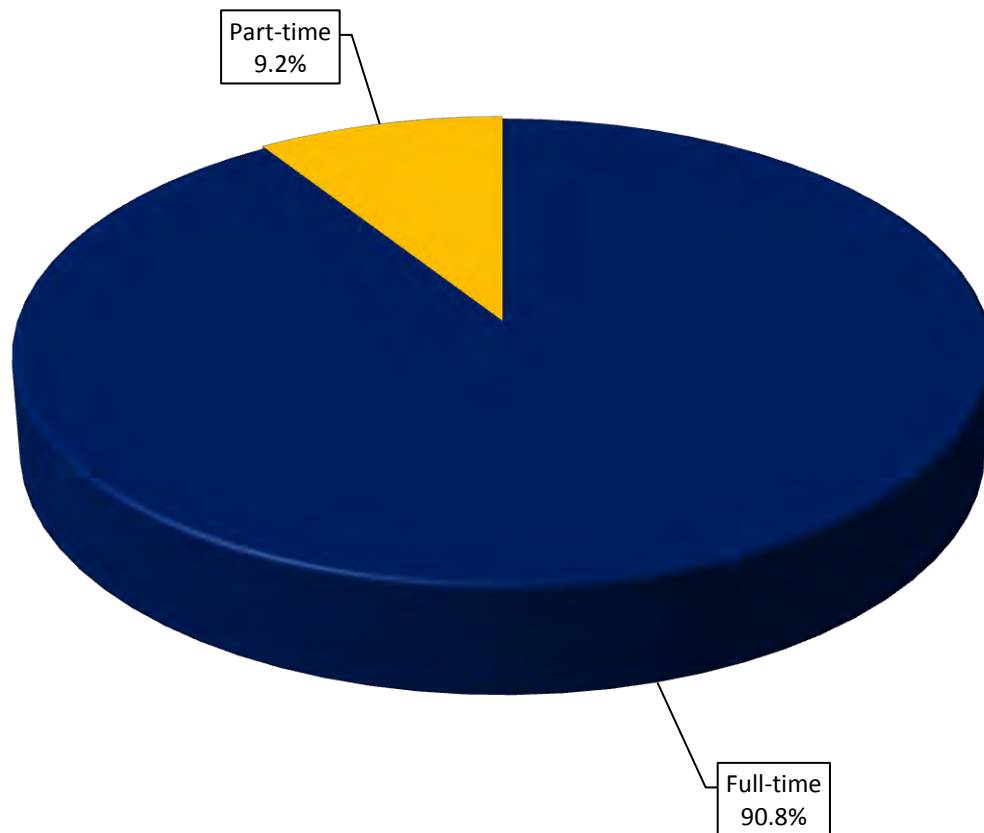

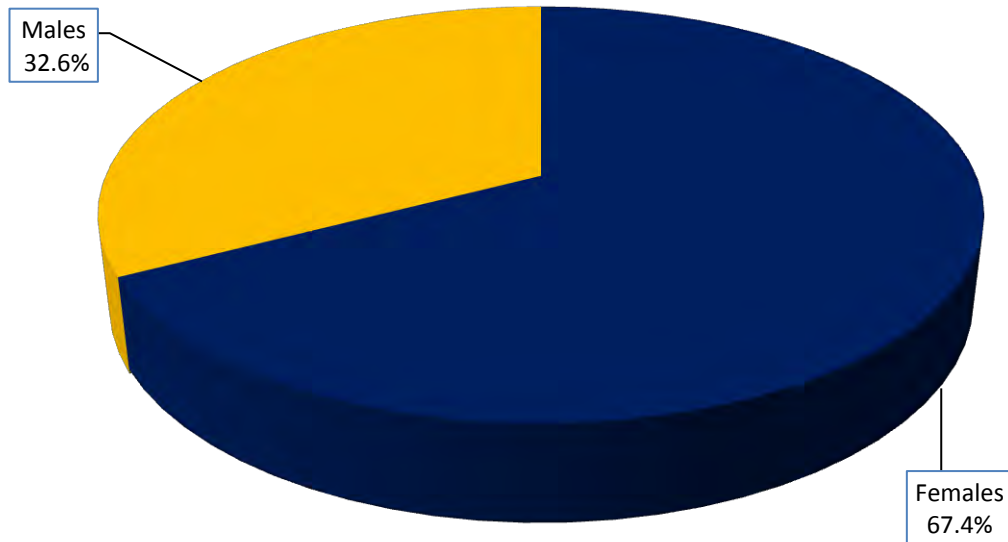

## PERCENTAGE OF GRADUATES BY GENDER

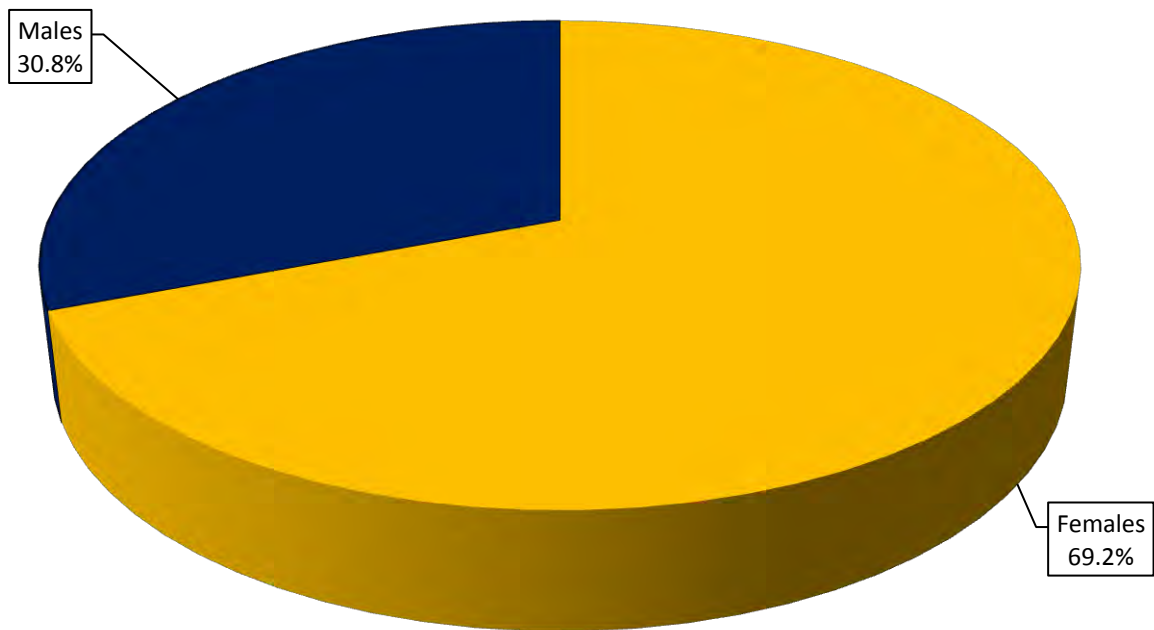

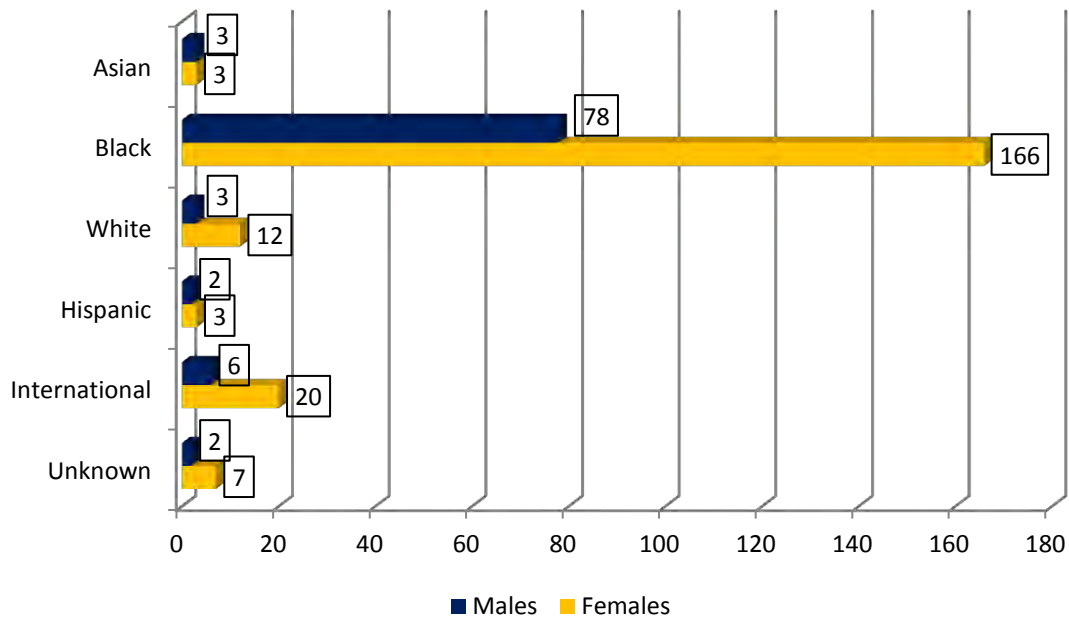
## **PERCENTAGE OF GRADUATES BY GENDER**

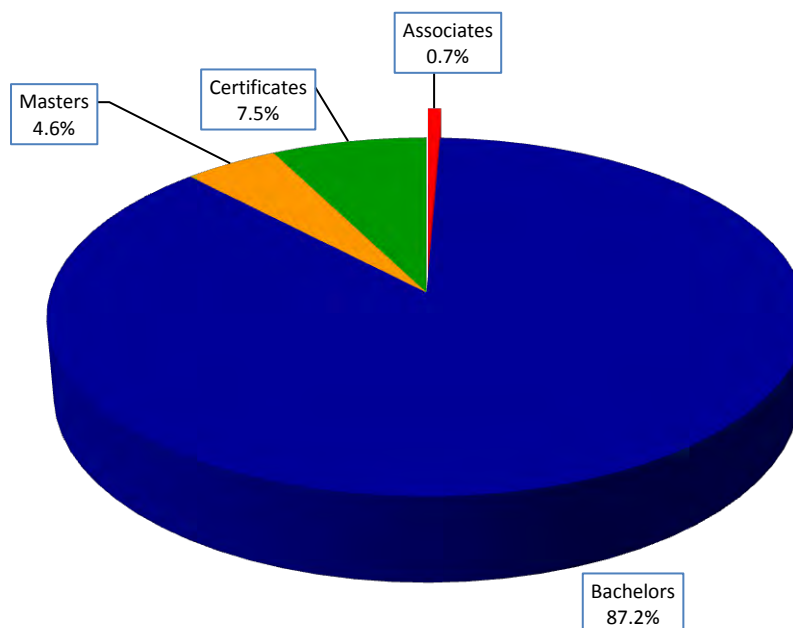

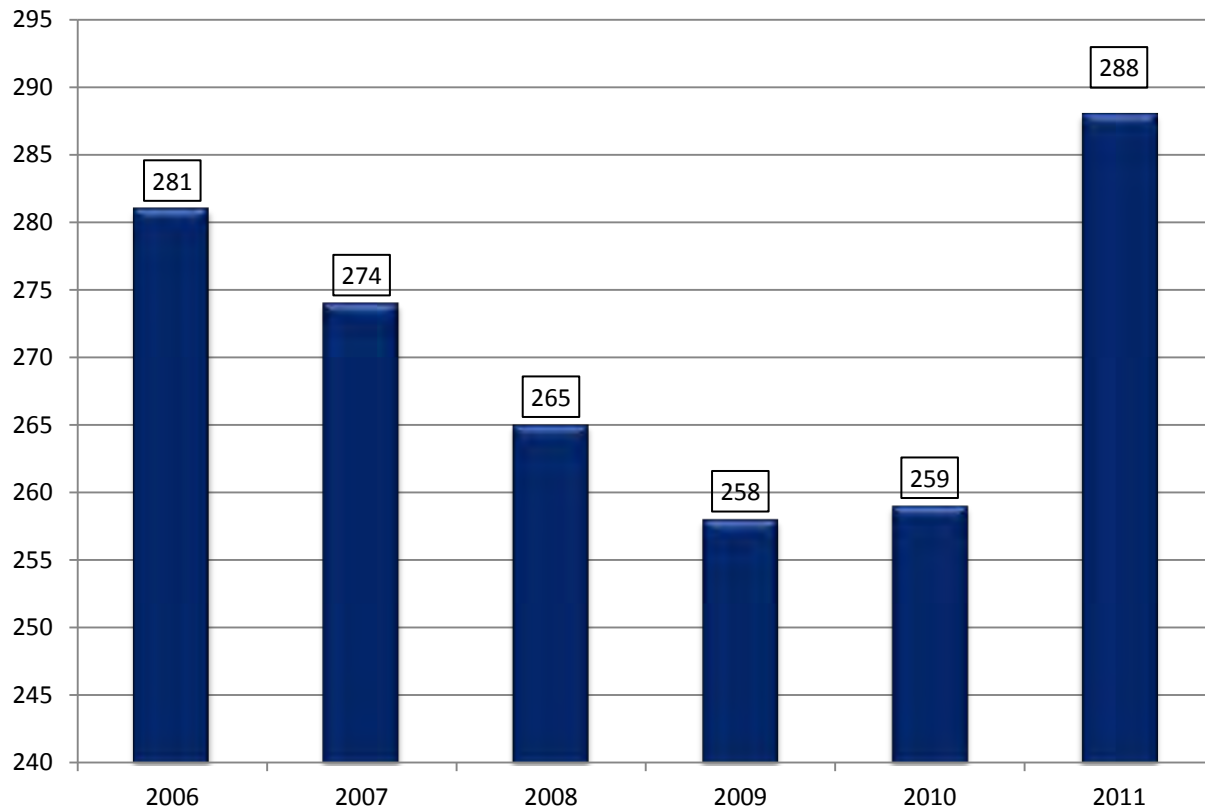
## PERCENTAGE OF DEGREES/CERTIFICATES AWARDED

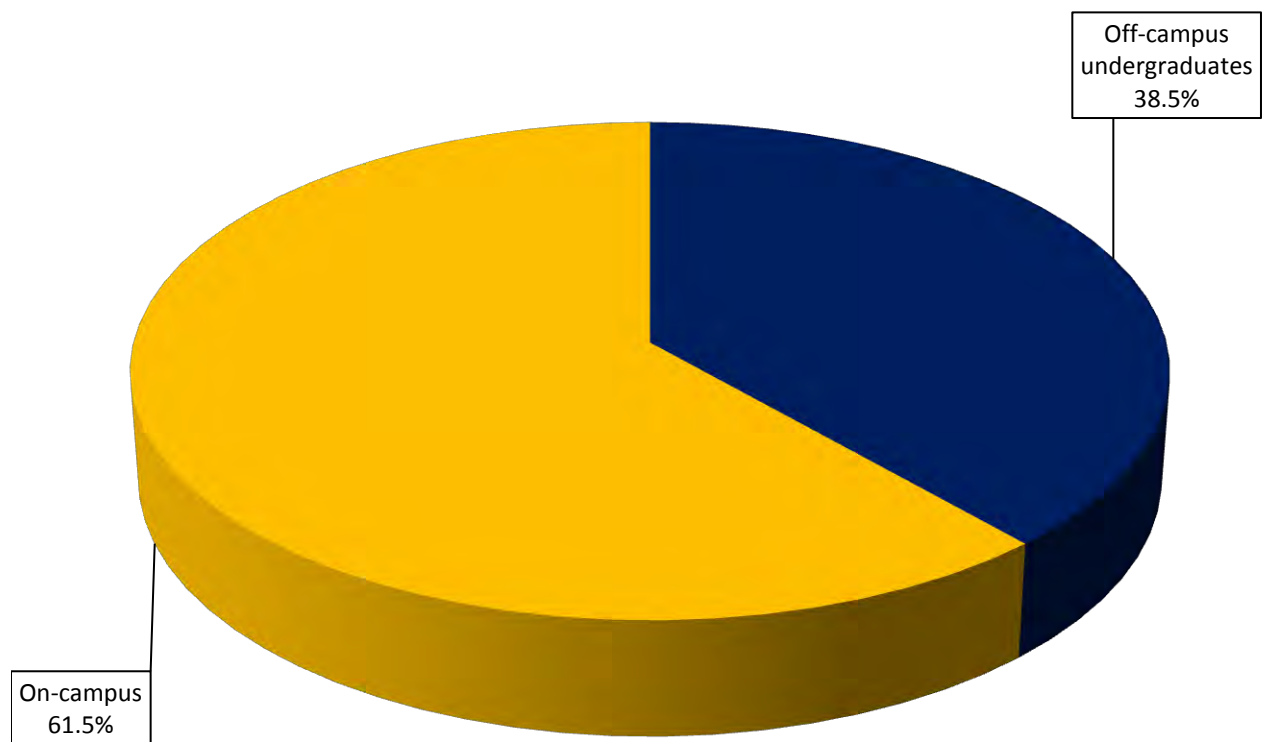

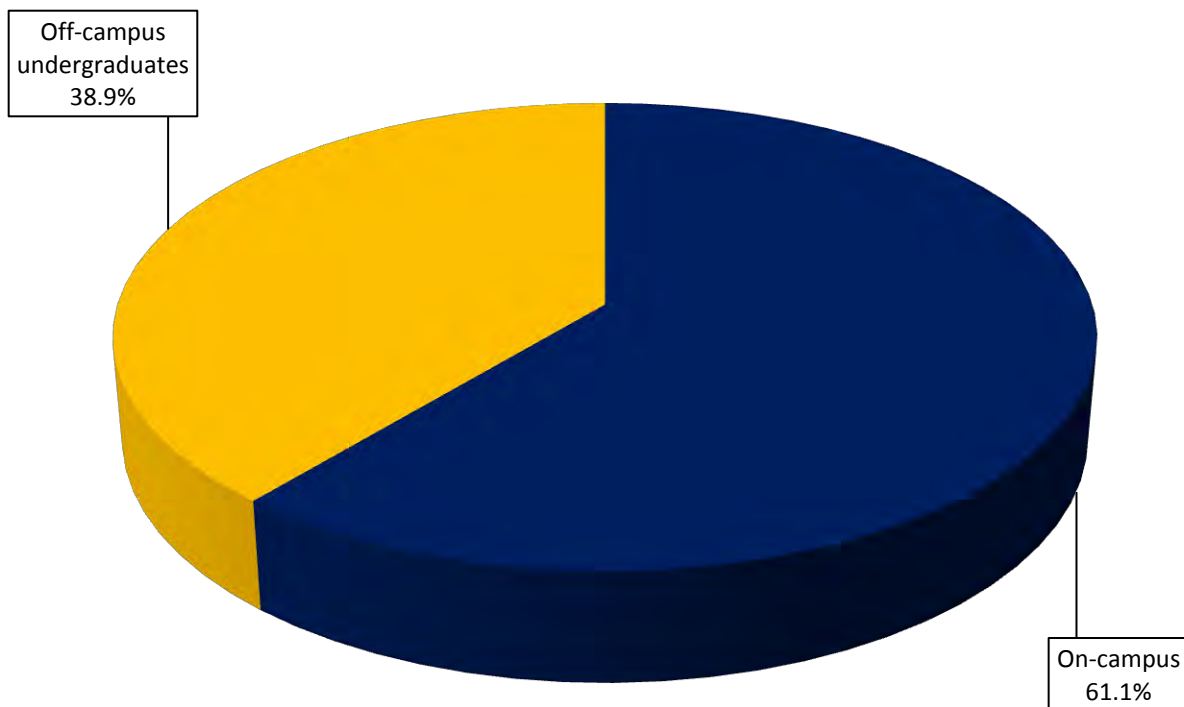

### RESEARCH RESOURCES

**Library Catalog** – Provides on and off-campus access to the library's collections of books and media materials.

**Databases** – Thousands of full-text e-books and articles, music, and other resources in all academic disciplines are accessible on and off-campus via the library's databases

**University Archives & Clara Peterson-Rock Museum** – This is a unique collection of artifacts, biographies, documents, manuscripts, and historical records about the history of Oakwood University Black Seventh-day Adventist Churches and Black Seventh-day Adventists. The Archives is open from 8:00 am - 5:30 pm, Monday through Thursday, and from 8:00 am – 1:00 pm on Friday. Call 256-726-7249 to schedule other appointments. The Museum is open whenever the library is open.

**Media Resources** – Houses and provides access to the non-print materials owned by the Eva B. Dykes Library. This collection includes more than 10,000 DVDs, CD's, videos, audio cassettes, production equipment and hardware. Listening and viewing facilities are available for in-library use of materials. Many items are included in the Library Catalog and may be checked out. Consult Media Resources for more information.

**Religion Reading Room** – Access to Religion/Theology reference materials. It is located on the main floor and is available when the library is open. This is a non-circulating collection.

**Periodicals** – In addition to the many electronic databases, over 400 current print journals, magazines, and newspapers are displayed and available for research and recreational reading on the third floor. Several very popular titles are available for in library use at the Circulation Desk. Periodicals may be checked out for 24 hours.

## **CIRCULATION SERVICES**

The **Circulation service desk** is located in the lobby on the main floor and is staffed whenever the library is open. It is available for checking-out and returning materials including reserves and interlibrary loans; picking up print jobs, reserving study rooms, and paying fines. Circulation staff is responsible for re-shelving library books and stacks management; answering questions about missing books, placing holds and other questions related to borrowing library materials.

**Reserves** – Items in high demand are available for 2 hour use in library. Reserve items are listed in the online catalog's Reserve Desk.
