ment and the community on a broad range of issues related to gender, faith, race and ethnicity, disability and more.

Kenneth is the President of Maximum Life Enhancement, a business management and educational consulting firm specializing in leadership and employee development training. Since 1990 has been the host/producer of a live, weekly radio talk show called "2nd Chance," which is broadcast on WJOU 90.1 FM, Oakwood University's radio station.

Two of the three academic higher education scholarships Kenneth has launched are at Oakwood University: the "25 Scholarship" and the newly established "212 Community Service Scholarship."

Kenneth has professional affiliations with the Huntsville Rotary Club, National Board of Certified Counselors, American Psychological Association, 100 Black Men of America - Greater Huntsville Chapter, FBI Citizens Academy Alumni Association, Partnership for a Drug-Free Community, First Stop, Inc. and the United Way of Madison County.



Raynon A. Andrews, M.D. is a Board Certified Family Medicine Physician. He completed his undergraduate studies at Oakwood University and received his Medical Degree from Loma Linda University School of Medicine.

Dr. Andrews completed his residency in

Family Medicine at the University of Alabama at Birmingham School of Medicine, Huntsville Campus. He is certified to perform Cardiac Nuclear Stress Testing and is certified in Advanced Cardiac Life Support. He is a member of the American Association of Family Physicians. Dr. Andrews volunteers at the H.E.A.L.S. clinic, which provides medical care at several elementary schools in low income areas.

Prior positions held include the director of development, National Minority AIDS Council; vice president of development, National Academy of Public Administration, Washington, DC; vice president of University Advancement at California State University, Dominguez Hills in Carson, California; executive director of the National Kidney Foundation of Southeast Texas; president & CEO of the Prairie View A&M University Foundation and assistant dean of External Relations, College and Graduate School of Business, University of Texas at Austin. Brown is one of one of 110 senior professionals to receive the Advanced Certified Fundraising Executive (ACFRE) designation and is an AFP certified Master Trainer. He is a frequent lecturer and teacher, and he has conducted fundraising trainings and workshops throughout the United States. Canada, China and Europe. He has published a number of articles on fundraising and diversity.

Freeman A. Hrabowski III, Ph.D., President of UMBC (University of Maryland, Baltimore County) since 1992, is a consultant on science and math education to national agencies, universities, and school systems. He was named by President Obama to chair the President's

Advisory Commission on Educational Excellence for African Americans. He also chaired the National Academies' committee that produced the report, Expanding Underrepresented Minority Participation: America's Science and Technology Talent at the Crossroads (2011).

Dr. Hrabowski was named one of the 100 Most Influential People in the World by TIME (2012) and one of America's Best Leaders by U.S. News & World Report (2008). He also received TIAA-CREF's Theodore M. Hesburgh Award for Leadership Excellence (2011), the Carnegie Corporation's Academic Leadership Award (2011), and the Heinz Award (2012) for contributions to improving the "Human Condition." The UMBC has been recognized as a model for inclusive excellence by such publications as U.S. News, which the past eight years has recognized UMBC as a national leader in academic innovation and undergraduate teaching.



Samaad Wes Keys, Ph.D. serves as the Strategist for the UNCF Career Pathways Initiative (CPI), and manages all facets of the CPI, a \$50 million grant-funded initiative by the Lilly Endowment. Through strategic grant administration, Samaad works with Historically Black

Colleges & Universities (HBCUs) and Predominantly Black Institutions (PBIs) to advance transformational change through the critical integration of student success-centered and career-building opportunities with the undergraduate liberal arts experience. The aim of the work is to support curricular enhancement that will lead to improved institutional and employment outcomes for all students.

Dr. Samaad previously worked at Achieving the Dream (ATD) as the director of equity & network engagement. He managed ATD's programs and policy agenda and worked with community college presidents and administration to build institutional capacity in Leadership & Vision, Data & Technology, Equity, Teaching & Learning, Engagement & Communication, Strategy & Planning, and Policies & Practice.

Prior to ATD, he served as the program assistant at the Association of Public & Land-Grant Universities (APLU) Office for Access & Success and the Southern Education Foundation (SEC). In both these roles he had an opportunity to develop and implement research agendas and programmatic efforts that increased the capacity of our nation's Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs). He also served as a high school teacher and case manager at Chamblee High School in Georgia which he credits with sparking his interest in higher education sector.

He earned a Ph.D. in higher education from the Univer-

sity of Georgia; Master of Arts in Education from Central Michigan University; and a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Morehouse College.



Marcus L. Lea is the new Director of the Office of Human Capital at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center.

Marcus was appointed to the SES in January 2015 and served as the Director of Human Capital Management at the National Nuclear

Security Administration (NNSA) until December 2016. He has over 16 years of experience in federal human capital management, including human capital policy development and administration, recruitment, outreach, employee and management relations, staffing and classification, compensation and benefits, executive resources, performance management, awards and incentives, training and career development, and strategic workforce analysis and planning.

A native of Durham, North Carolina, Marcus earned a Bachelor's of Science Degree in Business Administration from Morehouse College and a Master's of Science Degree in Public Administration from North Carolina Central University.



Ed Smith-Lewis is the Director of the UNCF Career Pathways Initiative (CPI), a \$50 million grant-funded initiative by the Lilly Endowment. Through his work, Ed partners with 24 Historically Black Colleges & Universities (HBCUs) and Predominantly Black Institutions (PBIs) to

implement a three-pronged approach to improve student success and career outcomes. CPI seeks to support institutions as they transform their institutional models to better prepare students for life after college. Prior to joining UNCF, Ed had a myriad of professional experiences, ranging from non-profit management to strategic consulting; working at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Howard University, and McKinsey & Company. Ed received his Bachelor of Arts in Economics from Morehouse College.

Ed has a passion for education, and has focused his career on ensuring that those who have the furthest to travel on their own educational journey receive the support, encouragement, and engagement needed to achieve their dreams.



William J. "Will" Miller, Ph.D., Assistant Vice President, Campus Adoption, an unabashed data wonk, leverages data best practices to help campuses make strategic decisions. He joined the Campus Labs team in late 2016, after serving as a faculty member and se-

nior administrator at Flagler College in Florida. There, as Executive Director of Institutional Analytics, Effectiveness, and Planning, he helped transform the campus-wide outcomes assessment process. He also served as Accreditation Liaison to the Commission on Colleges of the Southern As-

sociation of Colleges and Schools (SACSCOC). Before joining Flagler, he held faculty positions at Southeast Missouri State University, Notre Dame College, and Ohio University. Will's courses have explored topics in political science, public policy, program evaluation, and organizational behavior. His scholarly pursuits focus on assessment, campaigns and elections, polling, political psychology, and the pedagogy of political science and public administration. He received a Master of Applied Politics from the Ray C. Bliss Institute at The University of Akron, where he also earned his Doctor of Philosophy in Urban Studies and Public Affairs. He holds both a Master of Arts in Political Science and Bachelor of Arts from Ohio University.



DeShawn Preston, Ph.D., serves as a Southern Education Foundation (SEF) Higher Education Research Fellow. DeShawn primarily researches issues pertaining to developmental education and advancing opportunities for historically marginalized groups in education.

He has also helped coordinate a number of grant projects to advance students of color in higher education including: a social justice project, assessing student outcomes, new learning models for historically marginalized students, and ways to advance students in developmental education. His most recent publication, "Untold Barriers for Black Students in Higher Education: Placing Race at the Center of Developmental Education," focused on addressing race in developmental education was featured most recently by Inside Higher Ed.

DeShawn has a passion for examining how opportunities for historically marginalized groups may be enhanced, to gain access to undergraduate and graduate school, as well as identifying how institutional effectiveness may be supported at the institutions that serve these students (Minority Serving Institutions and Historically Black Colleges & Universities).

DeShawn earned a Ph.D. in Educational Leadership (Higher Education) at Clemson University. His dissertation topic examines the role and influence HBCUs play in supporting African Americans enrolling into doctoral programs. At Clemson he served as a graduate assistant in the Charles H. Houston Center for the Study of the Black Experience in Education, where he worked on program evaluations for college access programs. He also received a policy certificate at the Strom Thurmond school of Policy. He also holds a M.A. in American History from Howard University and a B.A. in History from Oakwood University.



Audrey D. Robinson, J.D., Chief Counsel of the Office of the Chief Counsel at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center, is responsible for addressing legal and regulatory issues affecting the Marshall Center and its organizations and serving as the director of the office. She leads a

team of highly skilled attorneys, paralegal and administra-

tive professionals. Ms. Robinson was appointed as Chief Counsel in 2011, the first Black Chief Counsel in the history of the Agency.

From 2005 to 2011, Ms. Robinson served as director of Marshall's Office of Diversity and Equal Opportunity. She was responsible for managing, planning, directing and implementing a comprehensive diversity and equal opportunity program at the NASA Marshall Center.

Born in Montgomery, Alabama, Ms. Robinson earned her bachelor's degree in chemistry in 1986 from Oakwood University. She received her master's degree in management in 1989 from the Florida Institute of Technology, and her Doctor of Law degree from Emory University School of Law in 1993. Ms. Robinson is licensed to practice law in Georgia, Florida and Alabama.

Throughout her 32 years of Federal Government service, Ms. Robinson has received numerous prestigious awards including NASA's Outstanding Leadership Medal. She is also a recipient of two NASA Exceptional Service Medals. She is a member of NASA's Senior Executive Service. Throughout her tenure as a senior leader and NASA legal executive, Ms. Robinson has championed diversity, inclusion, and equal opportunity.


